Target audience : Teachers of elementary grades 5 and 6, and secondary 1 and 2

Want to boost your students' interest in the topics that will be discussed in the "Meeting with LDT and guests" event?

Here are a few points you can address with your students :

BEFORE THE EVENT

Help your students ask themselves the right questions

- Who is Laurent Duvernay-Tardif?
- What are the inspirational aspects of his journey?
- What do perseverance, motivation, and engagement mean?

DURING THE EVENT

Encourage your students to reflect during the event

- What is Laurent Duvernay-Tardif going to talk about today?
- What kinds of things help Laurent and his guests stay motivated?
- Which guest made the biggest impact on you? How do you identify with this person?

AFTER THE EVENT

Help your students connect with the event's key messages by asking questions related to the following topics :

MOTIVATION

- What is motivation?
- What affects your own motivation?
- What helps you stay motivated in class?
- What are the differences between intrinsic motivation and extrinsic motivation?

ENGAGEMENT

What kinds of things keep us engaged in our educational journey? SUPPLEMENTARY RESSOURCE

What do these people do to maintain their engagement?

CAREER AND EDUCATIONAL ASPIRATIONS

What does the word "aspiration" mean?

An aspiration is a long-term interest and desire to work toward a future goal. Aspirations relate to how young people see themselves in the future.

You can begin some interesting discussions by asking questions such as:

- Is there anyone in your entourage who inspires you?
- + Why are these people inspiring?
- What do educational aspirations mean to you? What is important to you?







TAKEAWAY

When students understand an assignment's value, have the skills to accomplish it, and feel accepted and appreciated in class, they are more likely to be motivated and engaged in their educational journey.

GOOD COMMUNICATION : THE KEY TO SUCCESS

Talk to your students about their goals, aspirations, and values. Some are probably unsure about their futures. This is a chance to help them realize that it is completely normal to not yet know what they want to do later in life. Take this opportunity to talk to them about it and reassure them.
